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
Proposal for amendments to Regulation No. 54 (Tyres for commercial vehicles and their trailers)

## II. Justification

1. The current text does not provide clear rules for the minimum heights for markings for tyres with nominal rim diameter codes  $\geq 20$  and nominal section width  $\leq 235$  and for tyres with nominal rim diameter codes < 20 and nominal section width > 235. Furthermore, in the Figure above the table, lowercase letters are used to denote the dimensions, whereas in the table upper-case letters are used.

2. The current proposal aims at providing clear rules for all tyres and to use lower-case letters in both the figure and the table.

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
