Problem In A Nutshell

- PPPs are becoming more commonplace throughout the world
- There is a tremendous opportunity in the Commonwealth of Independent States:
 - Increased economic growth, which stretches the public sector's ability to finance infrastructure development
 - Crisis in basic service delivery (roads, schools, airports, housing, etc.)
 - Interest from governments in the potential of PPPs

Role of the UNECE ICOE

Set up by EXCOM in February 2012 to prepare:

- •Best practices ('best practices' was UK PFI; source countries of best practices are now far more numerous)
- •Recommendations (the best project models, legal and financial arrangements, feasibility etc..)
- •Standards (that could become the guidance notes that are issued by PPP units to Ministries and/ or into legislation)
- And help countries to implement them

UNECE - preparing international PPP global standards, with critical partners such as UNDP, World Bank, ADB

Why International PPP Standards

Need For Standardisation of PPP Process

 International Community has been unable so far to develop simple and operational guidelines and standards for the design, award and contract conditions for PPP

Need to Create Public Sector Capacity

 For many years public sector played limited role in PPP – because of limited PPP knowledge and dominance of financiers, private sector and consultants in development of projects



Why International PPP Standards? Contd...

- A large percentage of PPPs fail circa 50 %
- Many have to be renegotiated, get into distress and many also fail
- Many PPP Units fail to become operational
- Too many projects remain as 'phantoms'



Standards: A Two Staged Process

- 1. PPP Specialist Centres (Health, Renewable Energy, etc.)
 - Collecting best practices/ cases in specific sectors
 - Provide strong political commitment
 - Generate best practice knowledge
- 2. Creating Project Teams to develop UN Standards using the best practices
 - Project teams develop standards under the supervision of Governments (approval at every stage)
 - Follow seven stages of the Open Development process
 - Consultation with key stakeholders and a sixty day public review



Wiki Platform For Making Standards

Features:

- Chart the progress of the Project Teams in developing standards
- Transparent : Everyone has access to this system
- Experts can discuss PPP policy and exchange their latest thoughts and experiences
- Worldwide experts can engage in a multilateral dialogue, thus transcending national boundaries and learning ways to improve their own approaches

Benefits:

- Saves both time and money
- Brings people together



International PPP Standards and the SDGs

- In 2015 the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)
 will supersede the Millenium Goals (MDGs)
- Many of the objectives will be to radically improve access to basic public services water and sanitation, health and education, renewable energy ad transport etc. for the socially and economic vulnerable

Key Messages:

- 1. UNCTAD 2014 WIR estimates a USD 2.5 trillion per annum financial gap in low income countries to meet expected targets; argues that PPP models could fill the gap
- 2. The PPP models for filling the gap need to be based on internationally approved standards

How Belarus can benefit from the International Standards Knowledge Sharing Approach

- Certainty of outcomes and no longer 'leap in the dark '
 - Offer case studies, best practice, and research on PPPs
 - Provide practical project templates in specific SDG related sectors, such as road, hospitals, power plants, water and sanitation systems etc..
 - Better understand the private sector and the processes of engaging with private companies: e.g. market consultation, competitive dialogue etc..



Standards in 2014

Project teams established and approved in the following areas:

- Zero tolerance to corruption
- Schemes to reward compliance with Zero tolerance guidelines
- An optimal healthcare policy involving PPPs to achieve Universal Health Coverage



Conclusions

- International PPP standards will provide the missing link in global PPP development
- They will be Government approved standards established under the UN's independence and neutrality
- Help lay the foundations of doing PPPs in Belarus
