Protocol on Water and Health: main developments since 2019 and cooperation with the Water Convention



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Developments since 5th session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Protocol on Water and Health (Belgrade, 19-21 November 2019)

- Programme of work for 2020-2022 being progressively implemented, despite the COVID-19 pandemic
- Protocol governing bodies meet in virtual format (Working Group, Task Force on Target Setting and Reporting, Bureau, Compliance Committee)
- Countries continue to set and/or revise national targets under the Protocol (recently, BEL, BiH, CZ, PT, SP, etc.)
- Relevance of the Protocol in light of COVID-19 (need for resilient water and sanitation services, reliable access to safe water for all – particularly relevant to work under equitable access, institutional WASH and sanitation management areas). Special webinar series ongoing


- Analyse inequalities in access to essential WASH services under the pandemic




- Strengthen COVID-19 sensitive target setting

- Convene dialogue on experiences with WASH @ COVID-19














Protocol in the EU Drinking Water Directive recast

The EU Drinking Water Directive recast specifically references the Protocol in para 34 of the recitals as a mechanism to "assess the policy background and the baseline situation on access to water and to define the actions necessary to improve equitable access for all to water intended for human consumption"


Protocol tools supporting implementation of article 13 of the Directive:













Directive 2020/2184 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 16 December 2020 on the quality of water intended for human consumption entered into force on 12 January 2021.

The EU Member States now have two years to transpose it in national legislation.



(34) The Union and the Member States have committed themselves, within their respective competences, to achieving the SDGs, whilst recognising the primary responsibility of Member States in the follow-up and review, at national, regional and global levels, of progress towards those goals. Some of the SDGs and the right to water do not fall within the Union's environment policy or the Union's social policy, which is limited and complementary in nature. Whilst bearing in mind the limits of Union competence, it is nevertheless appropriate to ensure that Member States continued commitment to the right to water is in accordance with this Directive, whilst respecting the principle of subsidiarity. In this regard, Member States currently undertake considerable efforts to improve access to water intended for human consumption. In addition, the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe UNECE3 and WHO Regional Office for Europe's Protocol on Water and Health to the 1992 Convention on the Protection and Use of Transboundary Watercourses and International Lakes, to which many Member States are also Parties, aims to protect human health through better water management and by reducing water-related diseases. Member States could make use of the guidance documents eveloped under the remit of that Protocol to assess the policy background and the baseline situation on access to water and to define the actions necessary to improve equitable access for all to water intended for human consumption.












Progress in the ratification process

Cooperation between the Protocol and Water Convention

1. Increasing resilience to climate change

Global workshop on building climate resilience through improving water management and sanitation at national and transboundary levels (29-31 March 2021), organized jointly by Convention and Protocol



Conclusions of sessions 1 and 2 (water and sanitation):

- Climate change impacts water cycle by disrupting weather patterns, leading to extreme weather events, unpredictable water availability, exacerbating water scarcity and contaminating water supplies in short, medium and long term.
- Building and maintaining water supply and sanitation systems that are resilient to climate shocks requires integrated perspective on water, sanitation, climate and health and application of risk-based approaches and tools, such as WSPs and SSPs.
- Water and sanitation operators play an important role in increasing resilience to climate change.
- The Protocol on Water and Health is a powerful multilateral instrument that helps countries systematically address water and sanitation-related health risks arising from a changing climate
- Water, sanitation and health aspects are important to be considered in transboundary agreements

Future work under the Protocol in the area of climate change:

Strategic roundtable on increasing resilience to climate change through the Protocol on Water and Health, planned for January 2020

Cooperation between the Protocol and Water Convention (ctd.)

2. Assistance to support implementation at national level, through EUWI+ NPDs

Support with setting targets under the Protocol was provided in Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Republic of Moldova and Ukraine (according to countries' priorities)

3. Exchange of experience between the Protocol Compliance Committee and Convention Implementation Committee

In particular on the similar mechanisms of the Consultation Process under the Protocol Compliance Committee and Advisory Procedure under the Convention Implementation Committee



4. Future electronic reporting

Cooperation on a future online reporting system (possibly using a similar platform under the Protocol and the Convention)
