IFSS Common Principles - Overview

In all stages of a **Building's** lifecycle, sufficient measures shall be taken to implement the following five **Common Principles**:

1 Prevention

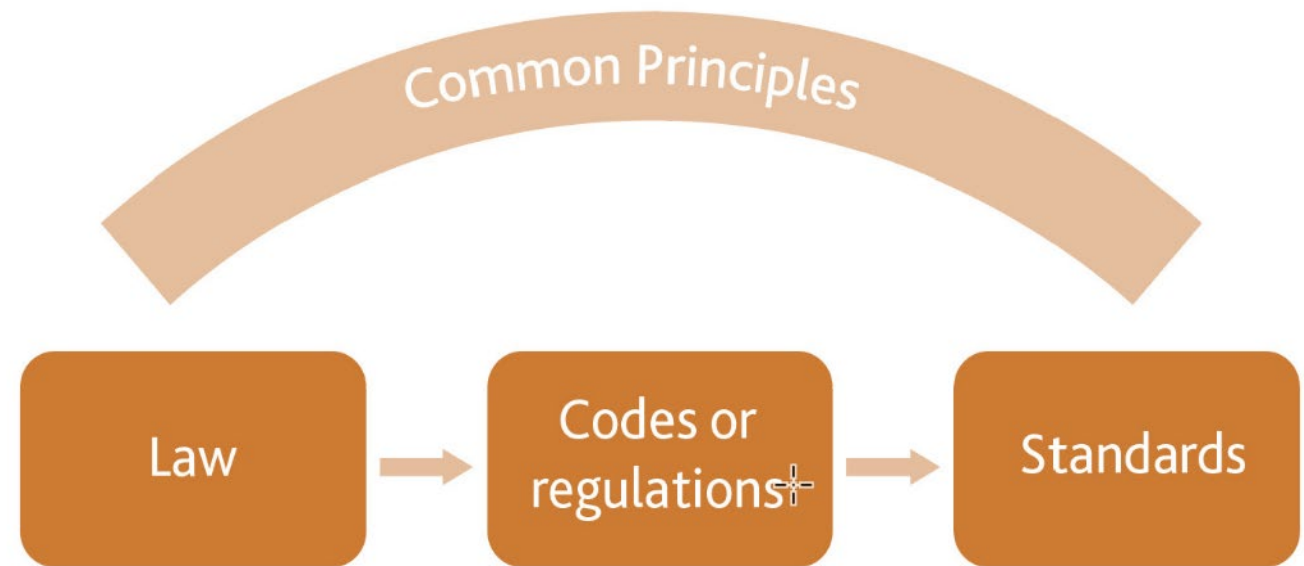
2 Detection and Communication

3 Occupant Protection

4 Containment

5 Extinguishment

IFSS-CP is intended to be flexible and non-prescriptive so that it can be adopted incrementally and will also advance good practice.



Interaction of Common Principles with Law, Codes or Regulations and Standards

Decade of Action for Fire Safety 2022-2032

Goal;

- To stabilise and then reduce the forecast level of fire fatalities, injuries, economic cost and environmental impact around the world by 2032 as global population increases.



Decade of Action for Fire Safety framework

Decade of Action applies the 5 Pillars;

- Pillar 1 – People
- Pillar 2 – Products
- Pillar 3 – Structures
- Pillar 4 – Infrastructure
- Pillar 5 – Communities



Decade of Action for Fire Safety

Objectives;

1. Encourage every country to have a strong and adequately resourced national fire safety focus
2. Establish a target for reduction of fire related fatalities and injuries by 2032
3. Improve data collection
4. Monitor progress and performance
5. Encourage increased funding for fire safety inc education & training
6. Develop public messaging, training & education
7. Develop fire-safe heating & cooking appliances for LMICs
8. Develop fire-safe building materials, technologies and systems



Decade of Action for Fire Safety

Objectives;

9. Implement sustainable fire safety standards, guidance, strategies and programmes
10. Strengthen management infrastructure, capacity and professionals employed in fire safety
11. Strengthen fire service capacity and firefighting infrastructure
12. Develop sustainable & fire-resistant communities through regulation, fire service & community support
13. Develop regulatory frameworks
14. Ensure regulatory frameworks considers life safety, wildlife fires, asset preservation
15. Review fire data and make evidence based changes to regulatory frameworks



Next Steps

Publication of the **Decade of Action for Fire Safety 2022 – 2032**
on **11th October 2021**

- Global communications
- Establishing a Decade of Action Committee

Furthermore, as the **Decade of Action** becomes more widely adopted and implemented across markets, the **Coalition** are planning to produce an annual report on progress.

Obviously this work will take some time as it will involve discussions with governments and other regulators and the published **Decade of Action** will act as a positive catalyst for future actions.
