Develop policy recommendations, tailored to national governments, non-state actors.




Provide a central hub of information and knowledge exchange on global policy actions, global standards, tools and best practices.

Align efforts with ongoing processes and events relevant to extractive industries




Projects on Critical Minerals & Metals (Critical Raw Materials)

What the data is telling us:

- ✓ Projects on financing for development are generating a wealth of information that could be better connected, tailored and used to frame the UN narrative on extractives.
- ✓ There is an opportunity to work more closely with the private sector and the financial sector in some of the priority areas as they have not been a prominent UN partner so far.
- ✓ Funding seems to be limited (mostly less than 1 million per project). Scattered small-scale efforts might need to be better understood, showcased and/or connected for greater impact.

- ✓ The Working Group could help bring further clarity and coherence to what the UN considers as 'critical metals and minerals' (or Critical Raw Materials) and the solutions we need to put in place to ensure their extraction contributes to sustainable development.
- ✓ Areas like circular economy and financing for development have not been fully explored by the UN and deserve more attention.
