## Norwegian Public Health Law 2012

The municipalities shall promote the population's health and wellbeing and contribute to reducing social inequalities - within the duties and means that are assigned to the municipality, including local development and planning, administration and the provision of services.






#### **Norwegian Public Health Law 2012**

- The Public Health Law showed how the Norwegian municipalities was supposed to facilitate a knowledge-based, cross-sectorial, systematic and long-termed public health work
- The recipe seemed quite simple and logic:
  - Make an overview of public health determinants
  - Identify the most important public health challenges
  - Implement goals and strategies to meet the challenges in municipal plans
  - Monitor relevant indicators
  - Evaluate measures and development trends







### The PHL required rational municipalities

Reality: interest conflicts, power struggles, sector budget competition, sector defenders with their own "sectorial language", fear of change, lack of understanding, lack of common goals, etc...



### The PHL required proper planning systems

Reality: fragmented planning system, lack of planning understanding, too many plans, overall plans were not systematically followed up in the financial plan or sector plans, plans with too much text, plans without clear priorities, etc....



#### Improving the planning system

- New Municipal Master Plan 2017-2027
  - Political steering tool short with clear priorities
- As few plans as possible
- Clear links between plans to secure follow-up of the Municipal Master Plan in Financial plan/Budget and sector plans
- Indicators highlighted in the Financial plan to check if the development is going in the right direction
- Using the planning system, we managed to implement a systematic, knowledge-based and cross-sectorial public health work – in the municipality as an organization.
