SDG 6.5.2: results of the 2nd reporting in 2020

Indicator 6.5.2: Proportion of transboundary basin area with an operational arrangement for water cooperation


High level of engagement

⇒In 2020: **129** out of 153 countries submitted reports to UNECE and UNESCO (co-custodian agencies)

Not on track

- ⇒Only **24 countries** report **all** transboundary surface waters and **groundwaters** covered by **operational arrangements**
- ⇒Progress must be **accelerated** to ensure that all transboundary basins are covered by operational arrangements by 2030


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Aquifer component: from indicator calculation to fostering dialogue

Insufficient knowledge on groundwater systems, BUT an unprecedented opportunity for countries to consider their transboundary aquifers:

- contacts between institutions and new data gathered at national level;
- gaps identified, allowing prioritization;
- Additional research carried out
- broader arrangements covering also groundwater/aquifers are identified and comply with operationality criteria
- possibility to promote cooperation on aquifers in concerned basins.

in the monitoring exercise, but data remains a challenge, particularly for transboundary aquifers and countries with no SDG indicator value

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







Capactiy building is important for negotiating and implementing operational arrangements

SDG 6 Global Acceleration Framework

Global legal frameworks

- 1992 Convention on the Protection and Use of Transboundary Watercourses and International Lakes (Water Convention)
 - Model Provisions on Transboundary Groundwaters
 - Practical guide for the development of agreements for transboundary water cooperation
- 1997 Convention on the Law of the Non-navigational Uses of International Watercourses (Watercourses Convention)
- 2008 Draft Articles on the Law of Transboundary Aquifers
- ⇒Practical support and an important basis to negotiate new arrangements or revise existing ones
- ⇒Need to make the best use of these instruments and interpret them in a harmonized manner so to foster transboundary water governance





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Next steps for SDG indicator 6.5.2

- 2023: 3rd reporting exercise: All countries sharing transboundary waters invited to report to UNECE & UNESCO by 30 June 2023 (updated template).
- Data collection and validation in 2023, and analysis in late 2023-early 2024
- Results inform the review of SDG 6 at HLPF 2023 and UN SDG summit 2023
- Priorities for 3rd reporting exercise:
 - Further improve response rate and quality of reports received
 - Improve coordination/harmonization at river, lake or aquifer levels
 - Reduce data gaps, especially for aquifers
 - Share experience on how to use reporting data
 - Use the reports as a basis for dialogue to improve cooperation and share experience
- Message for countries: please report and coordinate with neighbours, if possible
- Message for partners: please support countries and integrate the reporting into regional events, processes, prepare regional reports etc.
- During the 3rd reporting exercise UNECE and UNESCO will support through helpdesk, webinars, regional workshops etc.




