Social cohesion – A latent, multi-dimensional concept

- Social cohesion commonly refers to connectedness, trust and solidarity among individuals, across groups and communities, and within society at large
- Social cohesion varies across countries, reflecting unique histories, characteristics and circumstances
- Social cohesion is a latent concept and can only be indirectly measured through constituent dimensions

Some commonly cited dimensions of social cohesion	
Trust in institutions	Shared values
Inter-personal trust	Inclusion and integration
Sense of belonging	Social connections/networks
Socio-economic mobility and inequality	Participation



Social cohesion – Continued relevance in a changing context

- The concept of social cohesion included in some national frameworks and initiatives
- Concerns about the strength of social cohesion and threats to it
- The concept of social cohesion ...

... has been criticized for being overly broad ... overlaps with other concepts, such as social inclusion

• Between-group distance seems especially relevant today
