Report on contributions and expenditures in relation to the implementation of the Convention's work programme for 2022–2025*

Summary

The present report was prepared pursuant to the decision of the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention on Access to Information, Public Participation in Decision-making and Access to Justice in Environmental Matters at its seventh session (Geneva, 18–21 October 2021).^a It provides an overview of contributions and expenditures in relation to the implementation of the Convention's work programme for 2022–2025 for the reporting period of 1 January 2022 through 15 April 2023.

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I. General considerations

- The present report provides an overview of the contributions and estimated and projected expenditures in relation to the implementation of the work programme for the Convention on Access to Information, Public Participation in Decision-making and Access to Justice in Environmental Matters (Aarhus Convention) for 2022–2025¹ as of 15 April 2023 (the reporting period). During the reporting period, the secretariat continued to observe a high degree of caution in its allocation of resources, mainly owing to the fact that many contributions were not yet available at the beginning of the financial year, thus creating uncertainty as to the availability of sufficient funds. The secretariat made various efforts to encourage in-kind contributions and thereby reduce the impact on the trust fund. The secretariat will continue to pursue synergies with other United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (ECE) multilateral environmental agreements, United Nations agencies and other partners in order to maintain a satisfactory number of activities and share implementation costs. Capacity-building of authorities and advisory support to Parties were provided by staff throughout the implementation of different work areas, including on access to information, public participation in decision-making, access to justice, genetically modified organisms, promotion of the Convention and its principles, as well as the reporting, rapid response and compliance mechanisms.
- For the sustainability of the work under the Convention, it is crucial to ensure staff funding on a long-term basis. The extension of contracts for staff funded from the Aarhus Convention trust fund depends on the availability and level of contributions received. Since the current financial scheme is based on voluntary contributions and provides no guidance on their amount, the level of contributions fluctuates, making the funding of extrabudgetary posts unpredictable and far from secure. As in previous years, the secretariat was therefore obliged to prioritize securing funds for staff costs, which need to be reserved at least one year in advance of the issuing of a staff contract. The secretariat was able to allocate sufficient funds for staff and for activities during the reporting period only owing to savings accumulated at the end of each preceding year. It should be noted that the volume and complexity of the legal work of the Convention's Compliance Committee has significantly increased, including with regard to advisory support and capacity-building for Parties concerned, which requires the secretariat's greater engagement in terms of legal skills and time allocation. Furthermore, in order to ensure immediate support to the new work area on the rapid response mechanism, the required tasks were redistributed between and absorbed by the existing staff, mostly those supporting the compliance mechanism, while the recruitment of the remaining staff is ongoing.² Also, pursuant to paragraph 18 of decision VII/9 (ECE/MP.PP/2021/2/Add.1), adopted by the Meeting of the Parties at its seventh session (Geneva, 18-21 October 2021), the secretariat submitted a request to allocate regular budget resources to strengthen secretariat capacity for that purpose. The respective decision was adopted by ECE at its seventieth session³ (Geneva, 18-19 April 2023) and submitted to the Economic and Social Council for its consideration.
- 3. To ensure the continuity of work and effective delivery on commitments, the secretariat regularly had to reconsider the distribution of tasks among its staff members to guarantee the timely delivery of work when there were competing priorities. Furthermore, the heavy workload and the continuous demand for the secretariat's input place a great strain on staff, in particular in the work area on the compliance mechanism, a new work area on the rapid response mechanism and the work area on capacity-building and promotion of the Convention; the professional staff concerned consistently worked at more than 100 per cent

In 2022–2023, in line with the adopted work programme, the secretariat is undertaking the recruitment of two Legal Affairs Officers (P-3). Costs for a Junior Professional Officer who joined the secretariat in October 2020 were fully covered by Italy by October 2022; for 2023, Italy will cover 50 per cent of the costs and the remaining 50 per cent of the costs will be allocated from the Convention's trust fund; for 2024–2025, full costs will be covered from the Convention's trust fund. Also, to meet demands for legal work, one Environmental Affairs Officer (P-3) was replaced with one Legal Affairs Officer (P-4).

and, in periods of peak workload, at considerably more than 100 per cent. Other interlinked areas of work where the secretariat lacks human resources are capacity-building and promotion. There is a real need to strengthen cooperation with other relevant organizations, multilateral environmental agreements and processes dealing with human rights and the environment, and to devote more effort to the promotion of the Convention among non-ECE countries and in other international forums (e.g., international forums dealing with climate change, chemicals or health and international financial institutions). There has been a substantial increase in demand from countries, multilateral environmental agreement secretariats and international organizations for advisory expert support from the secretariat on the above-mentioned issues. Usually, these requests are made on an urgent basis, for example, immediately before and often during the other multilateral environmental agreements' Meeting of the Parties sessions or Implementation/Compliance Committee meetings. Support by the secretariat is pursued through providing substantive inputs to numerous reviews and documents prepared under other forums, liaising with these forums, delivering presentations and training sessions at relevant meetings and acting as a "help desk" to respond to the many requests from countries and organizations. Currently, due to a lack of capacity, the secretariat has to turn down the vast majority of requests. The heavy workload and the continuous demand for the secretariat's input place staff under great strain and lead to serious frustration among the countries and organizations concerned.

4. As of 1 January 2023, due to a lack of regular budgetary funds, all meetings serviced by the United Nations Office at Geneva are scheduled as in-person meetings. Services for online or hybrid meetings serviced by the United Nations Office at Geneva will be covered through extrabudgetary contributions, including costs for remote participation, and use of the authorized platforms (either Zoom or Webex) for hybrid and virtual meetings. The secretariat therefore has to adjust its working methods and meeting organization to take into account these new requirements.

II. Contributions

5. The "Adjusted contribution" columns in tables 1–2 below are intended to offer a more realistic picture of the actual resources available for use in a given year. Contributions by Parties and signatories are often intended for use in a year other than the year in which the contribution was deposited and/or received. The adjusted contribution figure in a given year is derived from the actual contribution in that year, minus any part of that contribution that was intended for use in a different year, plus any contributions made in years other than the reference year but intended for use in the reference year. Owing to the lack of timely funding for any specific year, the secretariat is obliged to use the available funds, as necessary. Amounts presented in all the tables below are rounded to whole numbers; amounts may also reflect changes based on exchange rate fluctuation between receipt of pledge and deposit of funds and possible bank charges. Table 3 below contains information on pledges for the previous 2018–2021 and current 2022–2025 work programmes as of 15 April 2023.

A. Financial contributions and pledges

6. For convenience, a full overview of contributions for 2022 and 2023 for both the Convention and the Protocol current 2022–2025 work programmes is provided in, respectively, tables 1 and 2 below.

B. In-kind contributions

- 7. The following major in-kind contributions were made in the reporting period:4
- (a) Support from the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe for the travel of non-governmental and governmental delegates, representatives of the judiciary and a number of participants from Aarhus Centres to the meetings of subsidiary bodies under the Convention and the Protocol; as well as for relevant activities of the Aarhus Centres related to the Convention and the Protocol;
- (b) Support from the United Nations Environment Programme for the travel of members of the judiciary and interpretation for the 2022 Judicial Colloquium and the fourteenth meeting of the Task Force on Access to Justice (Geneva, 26–28 April 2022);
- (c) Support from the United Nations Development Programme for the travel of members of the judiciary for the 2023 Judicial Colloquium and the fifteenth meeting of the Task Force on Access to Justice (Geneva, 3–5 April 2023);
- (d) Support from the ECE Regular Programme of Technical Cooperation funds to review, at the request of Kazakhstan and Tajikistan, their legal and institutional frameworks vis-à-vis requirements of the amendment to the Convention on public participation in decisions on the deliberate release into the environment and placing on the market of genetically modified organisms;
- (e) Support from a large number of organizations to the missions of the Special Rapporteur on environmental defenders;⁵
- (f) Support from the Ford Foundation (\$200,000 (for 2023), \$200,000 (for 2024)) to the Special Rapporteur on environmental defenders to strengthen the capacity of the Special Rapporteur's mandate, to build its visibility and profile and to expand its range of activities in the protection of human rights defenders at risk;

III. Estimated and projected expenditures

8. The estimated and projected expenditures for 2022 and 2023 shown in, respectively, tables 4 and 5 below are limited to those intended to be covered by voluntary contributions made under the Convention's and the Protocol's schemes of financial arrangements through the trust fund.
