Speed management tackling road safety in Argentina

Capacity Building: The project strengthened Argentina's technical capacity to

formulate speed management policies and strategies.

- Local Initiatives: Successful training and awareness campaigns targeting speeding were implemented in Cañuelas, Azul, and Pergamino municipalities.
- Key Findings: Data indicated that a significant number of accidents occurred near schools and high-traffic zones.
- Positive Impact: Measures led to revised speed limits, radar installations, and data collection for monitoring.
- □ **Local Empowerment:** Efforts equipped local authorities with cost-effective, impactful road improvement designs and the expertise to drive policy changes.
- Resource Mobilization: The project secured support from the public-private sector, including: Ibero-American Council for Safe Mobility, MAPFRE Foundation, Loma Negra, the National Road Safety Agency, the three municipalities, and CESVI research center.







Ten-step plan for safer road infrastructure in Tanzania



- Capacity Building: The project developed an infrastructure training, accreditation, and certification scheme to build local capacity for road assessment, audit, and design for improved safety.
- Local Initiatives: Over 500 people were trained through the scheme, positioning Tanzania as the second-ranked country globally for iRAP Accreditation.
- Positive Impact: It reshaped road safety practices in Tanzania and is a global model for safer road infrastructure through local capacity building and collaboration.
- Local Empowerment: It delivered recommendations for a National Road
 Infrastructure Safety Strategy and Action Plan. And it contributed to revising the
 Tanzania Road Geometric Design, for safety considerations to be integrated from the start.
- Resource Mobilization: Data collection and workshops facilitated knowledge-sharing, leading to recommendations that can influence over US\$ 1 billion in developmentbank financed transport corridor projects.

Reclaiming Streets for African Pedestrians and Cyclists

- Capacity Building: The project promotes pedestrian and cycling infrastructure across five countries supporting policy development, local implementation, and investments. The aim is to create safer streets and vibrant public spaces for all.
- Local Initiatives: Advocacy and community outreach events raised awareness on safer roads and how non-motorized transport fosters inclusive, liveable, and safe cities.
- Positive Impact: The project ran a series of workshops on capacity development in key areas including: road safety data, safer roads for children, bike sharing and street design.
- Local Empowerment: The project acts as a catalyst for safer, sustainable urban transportation and is fostering innovation, and policy development in African cities.
 Resource Mobilization: Strong synergies and collaboration were established with
 - IKI- and EU-financed projects, amplifying the impact. The project emphasizes a multisectoral approach building collaboration among governments, citizens, and the

private sector.







2023 New Project: Emergency care systems in the Americas



- Background: Road traffic injuries cause 90% of global annual deaths, mainly in LMICs.
 Better post-crash care could save 35% of these lives, with simple, cost-effective interventions.
- **Approach:** The project uses an integrated, multidisciplinary regional strategy to strengthen emergency care systems (ECS) in the Americas.
 - Priority countries: Belize, Bolivia, Costa Rica, Haiti, Honduras,
 - Jamaica, and Paraguay.
 - It will identify gaps and target solutions using WHO emergency care tools, such as ECCSA (Emergency Care System Assessment).
- **Expected Impact:** The project will:
 - -Strengthen ECS to improve the priority countries' post-crash response.
 -Reduce mortality through cost-effective emergency care interventions.
 -Provide continuous support and act on requests for technical cooperation.

2023 New Project: Safe journeys for Cambodian factory workers

Background: Cambodia's garment and footwear industry employs over 850,000 workers. Unsafe commutes, heavy traffic, and dangerous road behaviour result in road crashes, with 22% of those involving factory workers in 2016. To date, there has been limited investment in commuting and road safety improvements.

Approach: The project will:

- Engage 30 target factories through education, policy implementation, and worker advocacy, supported by a Public Awareness Campaign.
- Facilitate policy-level dialogues and advocate for legislative changes in collaboration with the National Social Security Fund (NSSF) and factories nationwide.
- **Expected Impact:** The project aims to:
 - -Increase factory adoption and implementation of road safety policies.
 - -Improve road safety behaviour, particularly helmet usage, among workers.
 - -Transition from unseated trucks to passenger/seated trucks.
 - -Influence government commitments and actions regarding unsafe transport.







#Moments2live4 - UNRSF Social Media Campaign
