Note by the secretariat

I. Introduction

1. The present document contains information provided by the Transport, Health and Environment Pan-European Programme (THE PEP) secretariat on the use of financial resources available in 2022 and 2023 to the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (ECE) and World Health Organization Regional Office for Europe (WHO/Europe) secretariats. Detailed information for 2021 and 2022 can be found in document ECE/AC.21/SC/2022/3–EUCHP2219536/1.1/3.

2. This note does not include the in-kind contributions provided by several member States and other stakeholders to the implementation of THE PEP programme of work, in terms of expert time, mobilization of technical expertise, hosting of meetings and workshops, engagement of consultants and participation in and support to the work of THE PEP Partnerships, Relay race workshops and Academy. These contributions are of paramount importance in advancing the implementation of THE PEP programme of work and are gratefully acknowledged. Lastly, this note also excludes the corporate resources made available by ECE and WHO to support THE PEP joint secretariat salary costs and provide conference services.

3. It should be noted that, in 2022, the WHO side of the secretariat was able to mobilize funding from internal sources to an amount equivalent to \$20,000. These funds supported the implementation of part of the activities related to the Health Economic Assessment Tool due to its global scope.

4. Unlike in previous years, in 2023, the WHO side of the secretariat did not receive voluntary financial contributions from the member States. In order to implement the activities mandated by the Vienna Declaration, WHO sought resources available to the WHO European Centre for Environment and Health, through the German Federal Ministry of the Environment, Nature Conservation, Nuclear Safety and Consumer Protection. These resources supported: maintenance and update of the Health Economic Assessment Tool for walking and cycling; and finalization of THE PEP publications.

5. In view of the low amount of funds in the WHO side of the Trust Fund for 2023, the WHO secretariat will review THE PEP workplan to reassess planned activities in line with resources, prioritizing the essential functions of providing secretariat services to THE PEP over the implementation of other activities, until a clearer perspective on the amount and predictability of dedicated resources becomes available.

III. Commentary of financial results

6. The secretariat would like to highlight the precarious financial situation of the THE PEP Trust Fund and in particular the likelihood that, without an increase in contributions, the possibility to fund the participation of member States in THE PEP meetings will be significantly reduced. ECE and WHO note that their internal secretariat rules do not allow it to draw funding for THE PEP statutory activities from sources other than direct funds from member States earmarked for this Programme; therefore it will not be possible to draw on funds from alternative sources in the short or long term, nor has this been done in the past.

7. The finances of THE PEP have benefited from reduced costs in 2021 and 2022, along with some financial contributions from member States. However, 2023 expenditure has been significantly higher, due, in part, to the work on the Strategy. Without interventions, the precarious financial situation will continue.

IV. Guidelines for the transfer of contributions to the Transport, Health and Environment Pan-European Programme

8. The secretariat provides bank information for the transfer of contributions to ECE and WHO/Europe to ensure the effective implementation of the workplan of THE PEP and the adequate participation of experts from countries of Eastern Europe, the Caucasus and Central Asia in its meetings. Contributions should be transmitted to the ECE THE PEP Trust Fund and/or to WHO/Europe.

9. For administrative reasons, funds for personnel and information technology infrastructure for THE PEP Clearing House should be made available to the ECE Trust Fund, while support for additional services to be provided by the Clearing House can be made available to either ECE or WHO/Europe. In general, resources made available through the ECE Trust Fund would mainly support activities with a strong transport and environment component. Funds promoting primarily health-related objectives could be directed to WHO/Europe.
