UNECE in-depth policy discussion on ageing: Combating inequalities in older age

Wednesday 22 November 2023, 10:00 am to 13:00 pm CET | EN, FR & RU | Geneva (Palais des Nations, Room VII)

Objective: In times marked by the megatrends of global ageing and the simultaneous increase in economic and social inequalities, we find ourselves at a pivotal crossroads. Currently, socioeconomic disparities among older persons are already large, and there is an imminent risk that these inequalities will only magnify among future generations, e.g., due to decreasing generosity of pension benefits. At the same time, tight public finances, especially in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic, are limiting many Governments' abilities to effectively reduce inequalities among their populations.

This year's in-depth policy discussion will present the most pertinent trends in socio-economic inequalities among younger and older generations in the UNECE region. The central aim of the event is to discuss the policy implications of these trends as well as to highlight concrete policy options for preventing as well as mitigating social inequalities among both younger and older generations.

Target Group: The in-depth policy discussion is designed for national policymakers, civil society representatives and other stakeholders.

Expected Results: The policy discussion aims to provide a heightened awareness of current and future inequalities among older persons and how they intersect. It will provide participants with concrete policy recommendations for addressing these disparities in older age.
