

# E. The Mediterranean Youth Task Force (1)





- It is a self-led group of youth
- supported by Silva Mediterranea Secretariat and EFIMED
- need and agreement to involve more young people to participate in forest sector issues in the region
- Mediterranean Youth Dialogue and Youth Statement: main challenges and recommendations presented by young participants to all stakeholders in the region
- promote and guide a regional network of engaged young people -students, researchers, young professionals or who have other active roles in the forest sector of the region



# E. The Mediterranean Youth Task Force (2)

#### 2023 activities:

- Organization of a side-event in partnership with IFSA focused on youth-led agroforestry during the World Food Forum (WFF) flagship event (October, Rome – FAO HQ).
- Masterclass "From trees to wellness" organized during the International Day of Forests (March)
- Contribution to the drafting of the article "State and priorities of young generations of the Mediterranean in the forest sector" for Unasylva
- Launch of the communication strategy and social media channels.

## 2024 planned activities:

- New Direction Board to be elected.
- Online series of masterclasses on Voluntary Carbon Market and its Climate Change Mitigation Potential – in partnership with the Youth Skills Hub of the WFF.

# The Progress report of the European Forestry Commission Working Party on the Management of Mountain Watersheds

## Mission and Structure of the Working Party (WPMMW)

## **Vision**

 The vision of the WP is to promote sustainable development in mountain watersheds with a view to enhance resilience to climate change and natural disasters and to ensure the long-term provision of environmental services by watersheds for both upstream and downstream areas.



#### **Institutional Framework**

- The WP is a country driven technical body under the umbrella of the EFC.
   Each EFC member country is also a member of the WP-MMW. Member countries officially designate a "focal point" from a related Government-agency, who represents the country in the activities of the WP-MMW
- Steering Committee provides programmatic orientation to the WP-MMW and serves as a representative body of its members.
- FAO hosts the Secretariat of the WP and provides logistical support



## Mission and Structure of the Working Party (WPMMW)

## **Working Groups**

Thematic or regional WGs form the main implementation mechanism to fulfil
the mission of the WP and to satisfy the different needs and priorities within
the European region. WG1 "Protective Forest in Mountain Watersheds", and
WG2 "Hazard and Disaster Risk Management in Mountains"



## **Biannual Sessions**

- The WP holds its sessions on a biannual basis, in the same year of the session of the EFC, ideally before the EFC session to allow for a timely preparation of the report and the presentation of the key outcomes of the meeting to the EFC session.
- The structure of the sessions of the WP includes the following components: technical seminar, field excursion, reporting from WGs, reporting from national partners/observers, deliberation on emerging issues, communication and housekeeping matters.



- Two Steering Committee meetings took place virtually. The October 2022 meeting marked a smooth transition of the Chair of WP from Austria to Italy, while the June 2023 meeting laid a foundation of the 34th Session of the WP.
- WG1 "Protective Forest in Mountain Watersheds", and WG2 "Hazard and Disaster Risk Management in Mountains" have prepared their work plans as outlined in their strategic documents.
- The Working Groups are coordinated by lead countries (WG1: Austria and Slovenia, WG2: France and Austria).



- In October 2022, WG1 held a workshop on "Protective Forest Management after largescale disturbance" in Villach/ Beljak, Austria.
- The workshop addressed the crucial issue of managing protective forests in general and after large-scale disturbances such as windthrow, bark beetle calamities, and wildfires.
- An excursion was organized to Lesachvalley, Austria, as well as Mojstrana and several other locations in Slovenia to enhance their knowledge of reforestation in the protective forest.

- 1<sup>st</sup> online workshop of the WG2 was hosted by Austria, on 'Loss of Protection Function of Forests due to Storm Events with a focus on avalanches' on 29-30 November 2022.
- WG2 also organized a workshop on "How to manage a catchment prone to torrential hazards after the disappearance of protection forests" on 8-10 November 2023 in Cerbère, France.
- The workshop explored the protective effect of forests against torrential floods, preventive management of protective forests against fires in mountainous areas, and management of torrential watersheds after a forest fire.
- Furthermore, a field visit to the Riberal torrential watershed was organized as a case study to develop a proposal on how to manage the torrential watershed after a recent forest fire.



- The 34th Session of the Working Party was held on 27 September 2023, followed by a workshop on "Management of mountain watersheds in a climate change perspective: from the Alps to the Mediterranean areas" from 28-29 September in Bolzano-Bozen, Italy (hybrid format).
- An excursion was organized by the Forest Department and Mountain Watersheds Department of the Autonomous Province of Bolzano on upstream watershed management, including forest damage and disturbance cases.
- Key messages:

"WP to focus on climate crisis and the consequences of catastrophic flooding and forest disturbances driven by climate-induced factors"

"Integrated watershed management, incorporating disaster risk reduction, should be a priority, and the EFC should expand its mandate to address these issues more comprehensively"

"Addressing the crosscutting and multi-stakeholder challenges in the face of climate-induced disasters requires a coordinated, multidisciplinary approach beyond forestry sector"



## F. Points of consideration

- The Commission may wish to take full advantage of the services of the Working Party and facilitate its work by:
- (a) Strengthening further their commitment to the Working Party, including through designating a focal point to serve on the Working Party.
- (b) Providing continued guidance for the Working Party, in particular in terms of identifying priority topics to be addressed.
  - (c) Publicizing the work of the Working Party and making full use of its services.
